



2025 SEED GUIDE

Includes Growing and Seed Saving Tips

The T.B. Scott Seed Library provides starter packets of open-pollinated, non-hybrid seeds of heirloom-variety plants to increase the array of plants grown in our community and to enlarge each Seed Library user's personal seed bank.


- Select one "BORROW" seed packet and a matching "RETURN" seed packet for each of the eight seed varieties available
- Checkout your seeds with the helpful Library staff

- Harvest your seeds; keep enough seeds for you to use next year, about 90%.
- Put the remaining 10% of your seeds into the "RETURN" envelope.
- Return seed packets to the Library to be used next year!





German Chamomile

Native to Europe, Africa, and Asia, chamomile has foliage and flowers with such a pleasant fragrance that for centuries these plants have been allowed to self-sow along the edges of paths and walkways where their fragrance can be enjoyed. This herb's graceful plants are 12-20" tall with endless 1" attractive, daisy-like flowers that can be used to make tea.

Instructions - Sow seeds indoors on surface of soil, 8-10 weeks before last frost. Transplant outdoors 8" apart in early spring just before last frost. Chamomile prefers well-drained sandy soil and self-sows freely. Sun/partial shade.

To harvest seeds, wait for the flowers to dry on the stem. Once dry, cut the flowers off and shake them into a paper bag or container to release the seeds from the flower head. Store seeds in cool, dry place for next year.





Rainbow Mix Carrot

If you love carrots, this is the mix for you! It contains four wonderfully distinct varieties: 'St. Valery's' (redorange, sweet, and excellent for storage); 'Cosmic Purple' (purple outside, orange inside, and sweet); 'Solar Yellow' (sunshine-yellow, sweet); and 'Lunar White' (creamy-white, sweet, and productive). All four varieties will delight your palate (and your eyes!) while dressing up your salads, soups, and sides.

Instructions -Sow seeds outdoors 3-4 weeks before last spring frost, or as soon as soil can be worked. Sow seeds 1/4" deep and 1/2" apart. Thin to 2-4" apart. Rows should be 16-24" apart. Carrots are slow to germinate and need steady moisture until germination. Sow successively throughout the season for fresh carrots.

When saving carrot seeds, let the seed heads fully ripen and dry on the plant. Carefully cut the seed heads off of the plant and place them in a paper bag or small container. Store in cool, dark, dry area.





Cardinal Climber

The bright cardinal-red flowers of this vine bloom from early summer until frost and have emerald-green leaves. While this climber is loved by gardeners, it is also irresistible to hummingbirds. The vigorous vines will climb 10-15' if given room on trellises and arbors and are well-suited to being grown in containers. Half-hardy annual. Although frequently visited by hummingbirds, the plants, seeds, and foliage of this variety are all poisonous—please use caution.

Instructions - Plant seeds outdoors after the last frost. Sow 1/2" deep, 4-6" apart. Seeds can be slightly chipped and soaked in warm water for 24 hours before planting for better results. Prefers full sun and moist average soil.

Once the flower is pollinated, a bulge will form at the base and the petals will wilt and fall off. Wait for the bulge to turn brown and "crispy," then crack open the pod to reveal small black seeds. Store in a cool, dry place.



Bird and Butterfly Mix

This annual and perennial mixture of flowers will provide nectar to many species of butterflies, including brushfoots, monarchs, skippers, sulphurs and swallowtails. Some of these plants will also provide food for butterfly larvae.

Instructions - Sow seeds outdoors 1 to 2 weeks before your average last frost date. Mix the seed with some sand or sawdust, broadcast the seed, and then go over the area with a rake to work the seed into the soil a little.

Varieties include:

Candytuft, Wallflower, Larkspur, Lupine, Gayfeather, Coneflower, Blanketflower, Aster, Cornflower, Poppy, Indian Blanket, Sage, Coreopsis, Godetia, Mint, Mexican Hat, Sweet Alyssum, and Black-Eyed Susan. Seed saving techniques will vary based on flower.
